RE: Atlantic Herring FMP Development (Am 5)

Dear Chairman Pappalardo,

I write to you today on behalf of the signers of the 1,100 postcards submitted with this letter. Volunteers have culled, sorted and scanned the cards into one digital document for your convenience and review. This effort was launched because many stakeholders have serious concerns regarding the development of Draft Amendment 5 to the Atlantic Herring Fishery Management Plan (FMP) and its current direction.

Honest By Catch is an educational effort, inspired by recreational fishermen, that attempts to communicate by catch-related issues to the general public. Please do not mistakenly assume these postcards are from "point and click" activists without "skin in the game." These cards were distributed and collected one by one at deep sea fishing operations, recreational fishing clubs, tackle shops, watershed associations, whale watch operations, and at similar locations and events where people who care about these issues are known to gather. This was not a bulk mailing or marketing exercise. The common link between all signers is that we are legitimate stakeholders and our opinions are worthy of your consideration.

People from 38 states participated in this effort. However, it should be of no surprise that the majority of signers reside in states served by the New England Fishery Management Council.

Removal of many new management approaches, continued delays in development, ignored advice from NMFS, failure of the Herring Oversight Committee (OSC) to develop alternatives as directed by the Council and failure to have even one discussion about protection of spawning Atlantic herring are all problems that led to this grassroots effort.

The following bullets are copied directly from the post cards. Each bullet is followed by our position statement, which ends in bold text with our humble request for your

consideration. We feel an alternative based on each of our requests would be an appropriate response to our concerns.

- **“Require 100% observer coverage, even if it means the industry has to provide funding.”**

The Plan Development Team (PDT) has made it clear that an accurate and precise estimate of catch cannot be accurately calculated by extrapolation, due to the industrial scale harvest found in the Atlantic herring fishery. Too much information is likely to slip through the nets. This is a truly unique fishery because of its massive volume. A simple mistake by a pair trawler can result in millions of juvenile fish being killed and wasted. In this fishery, even a rare event can be significant. The only real way to know what this fishery is catching is to watch what this fishery is catching. *We request that Amendment 5 include an alternative that requires 100% at-sea monitoring.*

This issue always seems to boil down to the question “who will pay for the observers?” As of January 1, 2011, 100% of recreational fishermen are required to pay for a license so they can be monitored. The groundfish and scallop fleets pay for their own monitoring when federal money is not available. *We request that Amendment 5 require that when federal funding is not available, industry must pay for their own at-sea observers.*

- **“Require that all marine species caught in midwater trawl nets be accounted for.”**

One of our largest concerns is the dumping (overboard or directly from the nets) of by catch (i.e. haddock, other finfish or mammals), incidental catch (i.e. river herring), and unmarketable catch (i.e. spawning/feeding Atlantic herring). Wasting valuable resources in the name of regulation is no longer an acceptable practice and is clearly a detriment to our fisheries and ecosystems. Sometimes this dumping is observed but often it is not. A captain has to do no more than release a codend subsurface and the observer on deck has no idea what species, what size or what volume was in that net. What seems like years ago was the OSC meeting when a DC Lawyer for the herring industry made comment that he was seeking loopholes. *We request that Amendment 5 include an alternative that applies the Closed Area 1 dumping rules to the whole fishery. We further support the Council’s September 2010 adjustment to charge quota for dumping up to area specific ceilings, after which a trip termination measure would apply in that area.*

- **“Protect decimated river herring stocks from being caught at sea.”**

Industry admits that at certain times of year, in certain locations, the Atlantic herring fleet can and does catch river herring. Current numbers from observer data show that these by catch events are often larger than many individual river herring runs. Work done by the PDT has recently identified a number of “hot spots” where this by catch is likely to occur. Unfortunately, recent actions by the OSC have turned toward monitoring as opposed to protection. *River herring protection, in addition to monitoring* is being called for by many people in communities from Maine to North Carolina. Amendment 5 should have some measures that will protect river herring and not just monitor ongoing by catch. *We request that one alternative in Amendment 5 set a cap on river herring by*

catch. This cap could simply be based on recent catch. In addition, we request "hot spot" effort controls also be included in the document.

- **"Prohibit mid water trawling in areas designated to protect juvenile and spawning groundfish."**

When this fishery was given access to the groundfish-closed areas, the NEFMC was convinced the fleet was not fishing on the bottom and did not catch groundfish. Today, industry readily admits that mid water trawl gear is in regular contact with the bottom. In addition, the problems this fleet is having with their haddock by catch cap are well documented and confirm this gear does catch groundfish. Fishermen in other fisheries continue to struggle with regulations related to rebuilding of groundfish. *We request an alternative in Amendment 5 that considers prohibition of mid water gear in groundfish-closed areas. Without this, the amendment is unacceptable and will not present a full range of alternatives.*

In conclusion we believe our proposed alternatives are reasonable, affordable and implementable. On behalf of this varied group of citizens who took the time to make this statement I hope you give our comments serious consideration.

Next to menhaden (already at less than 1% of 19th century levels) alewives have the greatest lipid content per pound of the clupeid order, and are therefore the second best forage fish for those species we value most--cod, haddock, hake, pollock, cusk and halibut--as well as the large pelagics. Without a healthy clupeid stock, the inshore demersals will never recover their pre-trawler numbers, and when the cost of diesel fuel triples, as it must within two decades, there will be no fishery for the traditional small-port, family-owned vessels.

River herring is a historically important species and an important forage fish. In the past few years its numbers have been decimated by uncontrolled fishing, largely by midlevel trawlers that are supposedly targeting other fish. It is time to stop this senseless and unnecessary waste of a valuable resource. Managers of this fishery should act in the public interest to enforce meaningful controls to prevent this shameful loss of river herring as bycatch.

Recent estimates indicate that there is an average annual bycatch of 670,000 pounds roughly 2.5 million river herring. Observer data show that hundreds of thousands of river herring can be scooped up in a single net tow by a herring midwater trawl vessel more fish than are recorded in many of the state's largest river herring runs.

Please protect these fish and help advance their recovery. At your January meeting, I urge you to support an annual bycatch cap as an option in Amendment 5 to the Atlantic Herring Fishery Management Plan. It is my understanding that you have both the tools and the precedents to determine and implement the cap. 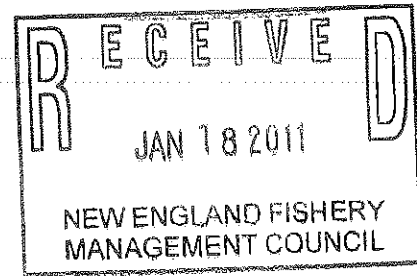

The DRSFA is a Conservation Group dedicated to preserving, protecting and restoring migratory fish to the Delaware River and its tributaries. We are an organization consisting of several hundred members throughout the Mid-Atlantic region. Over the past two decades we have witnessed a staggering decline in our river herring population. Of the many tributaries along the Delaware River few if any see herring anymore. I have personally witnessed a 100% decline in the annual herring run along the Tohickon Creek where I have lived for the past years.

We are seriously concerned about the bycatch of river herring in the Atlantic herring fishery and the impact this is having on already decimated populations.

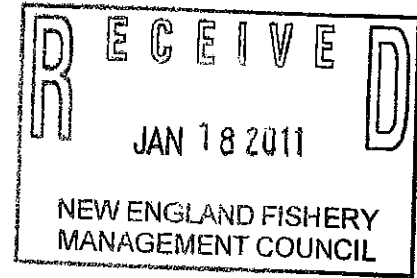

Dear Council Members,

I am writing on behalf of the Mystic River Watershed Association (MyRWA) in support of an **annual river herring bycatch cap**.

The Mystic River Watershed Association (MyRWA) is a grassroots organization dedicated to the protection and restoration of the Mystic River, its tributaries, and related natural resources throughout the watershed's 22 communities. As an important Boston harbor estuary, the Mystic River historically has had a very sizable annual herring run. A tributary of the Mystic River, Alewife Brook, is named in honor of this migration. Over recent decades, however, the Mystic River and its tributaries have seen a measurable decline in the numbers of fish returning to the river.

Communities throughout New England, with the help of both state and federal agencies, have been working tirelessly to clean our rivers, improve water quality, remove dams and improve habitat in order to restore the historic river herring runs that are such an important part of our history.

All our efforts will be for naught however, if these fish continue to undergo "incidental," but preventable, slaughter at sea. Current estimates place annual river herring bycatch at 670,000 pounds with substantial numbers of these fish caught by high-volume midwater trawl vessels. Publicly available data from the Northeast Fishery Observer Program show that many hundreds of thousands of river herring can be caught in one tow of a midwater trawler's net, which is more fish than have recently been recorded in many of New England's largest river herring runs.

Last May, fourteen New England watershed associations and other local environmental groups wrote to the Chair of your Herring Oversight Committee, Doug Grout, suggesting a number of management alternatives for dealing with the very serious problem of river herring bycatch in the Atlantic herring fishery (see attached letter). We are writing you now because **we believe it is critically important that when the New England Fishery Management Council meets in January, 2011, it approves a comprehensive range of options in Amendment 5 that adequately address river herring bycatch and improvements to the catch monitoring program in the Atlantic herring fishery.**

Specifically, we favor inclusion of the following options to address river herring bycatch:

- An **annual river herring bycatch cap** to limit bycatch and create an incentive for herring vessels to avoid areas where river herring are caught in high numbers;
- 100% observer coverage on all midwater trawl vessels, especially in areas identified as hotspots for river herring bycatch



- A requirement to bring *all* fish aboard the vessels for sampling by an observer. In other words, no catch can be allowed to be discarded at sea or transferred to another vessel unless the catch can be made available for sampling by an observer;
- Closure of areas identified as river herring bycatch hotspots to midwater trawling (Category A & B permits);
- "Move along" rules that require vessels to move out of areas with high river herring bycatch rates.

We urge the Council to not overlook the importance of approving a full range of management alternatives for further environmental review and public comment. Addressing monitoring and river herring bycatch issues in this industrialized fishery continues to be a major concern and is key to our ongoing efforts to protect and restore critically important river herring to our region's rivers and watersheds.

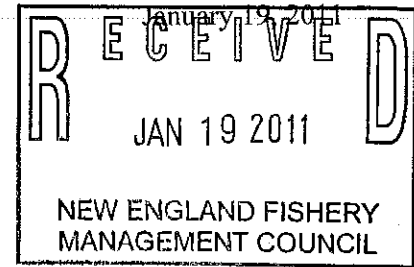

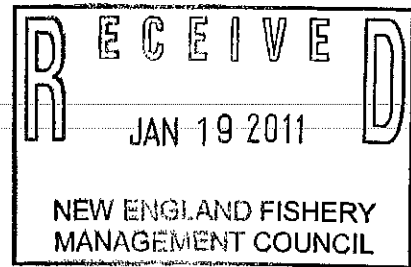

Dear Mr. Grout:

We the undersigned represent a group of watershed organizations who are deeply concerned about the plight of river herring in New England. Our organizations are devoted to restoring ecological health to rivers throughout the region. This work certainly includes recovery of faltering runs of alewife and blue back herring (i.e., river herring) – fish which are crucial to river ecosystems as prey for birds, mammals and other fish. Communities throughout New England have worked tirelessly to restore water quality and remove dams and other obstacles to river herring. Nevertheless, many runs have continued to decline and most are much smaller than they were historically.

We are writing today because we are very concerned about impacts on river herring that are occurring in federally-managed sea fisheries while river herring are plying the same waters used by Atlantic herring and mackerel. Publicly available data from NMFS observers show that substantial numbers of river herring are caught by small mesh fisheries for Atlantic herring and mackerel. Additionally, widespread concerns about declines in river herring and incomplete data on what is being landed and discarded at sea have lead the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission (ASMFC) to call on the Secretary of Commerce to take *Emergency Action* to address at-sea impacts to river herring through better monitoring of the small mesh fisheries (May 27, 2009). The Mid-Atlantic Fishery Management Council (June 24, 2009) and the New England Fishery Management Council (June 26, 2009) saw fit to write letters to the Secretary making similar requests. The New England Fishery Management Council has identified river herring catch as a priority for what has become Amendment 5 to the Atlantic Herring Fishery Management Plan.

We are not alone in our concerns about river herring and what is happening to them at sea in high-volume fisheries, where the catch may be viewed as insignificant amidst hundreds of thousands of tons of Atlantic herring and mackerel but could be devastating to small populations returning to natal rivers and streams. We are so concerned about this matter that we have joined others throughout the community committed to addressing this particular problem in federal fisheries, including the Herring Alliance.

We urge the Herring Oversight Committee and the Council to make monitoring and bycatch reduction in the Atlantic herring fishery as strong as it can possibly be in Amendment 5. We urge you to enhance at-sea monitoring, placing observers on all large-scale trawl vessels, put an end to the practice of large-scale discarding at sea (i.e., slipped nets) and immediately implement

a series of closures that can reduce river herring catch in known problem areas. We respectfully request that you make our letter available to the Herring Oversight Committee as part of the materials for the May 17, 2010 meeting.


